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
### Introduction

You are young. You want a better life. You have difficult situations. You have dreams, aspirations, and goals. These lessons are for you.

We will be studying the stories of some young people like you, some who left their homeland, who had experiences similar to yours, and from whom you can obtain valuable principles that can help you in life. To grow in the Christian life, a person needs to be real, genuine, and committed. Only God can make that happen in you. It is our desire that through the lessons that follow, you can find the real God, who gives meaning to your life and who wants to transform you.

### Real Leadership

"The greatest want of the world is the want of men,—men who will not be bought or sold; men who in their inmost souls are true and honest; men who do not fear to call sin by its right name; men whose conscience is as true to duty as the needle to the pole; men who will stand for the right though the heavens fall." EGW







**1 Samuel 16:12**: "So Jesse sent for him. He was dark and handsome, with beautiful eyes. And the Lord said, 'This is the one; anoint him.' So as David stood there among his brothers, Samuel took the flask of olive oil he had brought and anointed David with the oil. And the Spirit of the Lord came powerfully upon David from that day on. Then Samuel returned to Ramah."

Do you think David's father held him in high regard? How do you feel when you are not highly regarded, when you are ignored, when others dismiss you? How do you react?

This lesson teaches us three principles:

- 1. Talent is not enough. King Saul was tall and handsome. David's older brother was a good soldier and the firstborn in his family. However, they were rejected as leaders by God. Both had talent but lacked a godly character. God is looking for people who have a character like Jesus. Do you know someone who has many talents but is wasting them? What are you doing with the talents God gave you?
- 2. What matters is what God thinks of you. David's father did not think his son could be a king. In his mind, the only thing David could do was be a shepherd. As a young person, perhaps you have run into people who did not think much of you. Have you experienced discrimination? Have you experienced rejection? How do you react when others do not believe in you, when you are cast aside, when you are ignored or passed over for a promotion?
- **3.** To be where you want to be, give your best where you are. David was the best shepherd he could be. He was a leader and a musician, even though they had him tending sheep. He did not become bitter or give less than excellent effort. He did everything with enthusiasm and humility, and God promoted him in His time. Do you think you're at the place in your work, school, or life where you want to be? What kind of attitude do you have while waiting for a better opportunity? Are you giving your best where you are?



This week, give your best where you are. Remember that even if others do not recognize your effort, talent, or work, God does. Have faith that, in time, God will promote you.

Psalm 142:3: "When I am overwhelmed, you alone know the way I should turn. Wherever I go, my enemies have set traps for me. Here are three points we can apply in our lives:

- 1. We attract what we are. When David was living in the cave, it was a very difficult time in his life and he was down. The people who approached him were also down on their luck—the people who had debts, the afflicted, those who had problems. What kind of people surround you? Who are your friends? If you want to change your life, change your friends! Friends say more about you than about them.
- 2. Do your best—be the best you can where you are. First Samuel 22:2 says that David became captain over the people who came to him. In other words, he was their leader. If he could not be a leader in the palace, at least could be the best leader of the cave. Do you find it difficult to give your best when circumstances are less than favorable? How does your attitude reflect the problems in your life?
- **3.** God gave everything back, even better than before. If we read the end of the story, we see God giving back to David all that was lost. That's why he could write **Psalm 142** (see "Reveal" above) when he was in the cave. What have you lost lately? What do you need God to give you back, better than before?



This week, look at the people who are with you and around you. Ask yourself how you can become a leader to encourage, rather than a victim who suffers.





1 Samuel 17:45-47: "David replied to the Philistine, 'You come to me with sword, spear, and javelin, but I come to you in the name of the Lord of Heaven's Armies—the God of the armies of Israel, whom you have defied. Today the Lord will conquer you, and I will kill you and cut off your head. And then I will give the dead bodies of your men to the birds and wild animals, and the whole world will know that there is a God in Israel! And everyone assembled here will know that the Lord rescues his people, but not with sword and spear. This is the Lord's battle, and he will give you to us!"

David had to overcome several obstacles and provocations before he could kill the giant.

- 1. David's father, who tried to limit him. What did he ask David to do? **1 Samuel 17:17–18**. (Note that his father did not ask him to go into battle, only to carry out errands and bring back news.) Has someone ever tried to limit you? How did you react? Share your experience.
- 2. The soldiers, who talked a lot but did not fight. What routine did the soldiers engage in daily? 1 Samuel 17:20–21. How did they react when Goliath appeared? 1 Samuel 17:24
- 3. His oldest brother, who judged his motives. How did Eliab treat David publicly?

  1 Samuel 17:28–29. Why do you think he acted that way toward David?

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- 4. King Saul, who tried to have David do things his way. What was David's reaction as he tried on Saul's armor? **1 Samuel 17:38–39**
- 5. The words of Goliath to David. **1 Samuel 17:41–44**. How did Goliath speak to David? Note what he did: (a) provoked; (b) insulted; (c) mocked; and (d) cursed. How do you react when your friends make fun of your religion or insult God with curses?



This lesson offers three principles you can act on:

- 1. Do not let the people around you determine your actions. David ignored the limitations set by his father, the fear of the soldiers, the aggressiveness of his brother, and the controlling spirit of the king. He had a purpose, to kill the giant. How difficult or easy is it for you to ignore other people's criticism and pursue your goals and objectives?
- 2. Defend the cause of God. Many times we find ourselves in situations where other people are hostile through their words and actions to the cause of God. To be silent in these times is to be complicit. How public is your faith in your school, work, or neighborhood?
- **3.** One person can make a difference. Sometimes we think that a person can't do much on their own. Today's story reveals that this is false. One person can, if they are guided by God. In which areas of your life are you frustrated because you do not receive support from others? Go ahead anyway!



This week, decide to get up and defend the cause of God even when your decision is not popular. When you are alone and no one supports you, trust in God and do the right thing anyway.

#### PART 2

### **Real Dreams**

"God's ideal for His children is higher than the highest human thought can reach." —EGW  $\,$ 







Genesis 37:5-7: "One night Joseph had a dream, and when he told his brothers about it, they hated him more than ever. 'Listen to this dream,' he said. 'We were out in the field, tying up bundles of grain. Suddenly my bundle stood up, and your bundles all gathered around and bowed low before mine!' "

Take these points and use them in your life:

- 1. Not everyone will understand your dreams. Joseph's family did not accept the fact that he was special. God gives us dreams, but others may not understand and will try to derail the dreams God has given us. Can you think of an idea, dream, or wish you had that you shared with another but did not find support?
- 2. The paths of God are not the same as you might want or even imagine. God told Joseph that he would be a leader, but did not tell him where or when. Joseph never could have imagined that he would be a leader in a strange land. Perhaps you have come to this country as an immigrant and do not know what God wants for your life. How does Joseph's story help us to have faith in God's plan and not despair?
- **3.** God will always find someone to protect you. In the story of Joseph, we see that God put certain people in place to protect and help Joseph. The young man went through testing but was never alone. Who supports you? Who can you turn to when you are in trouble?



This week, do not let others kill your dreams. When you have critics, forgive and love them.





Genesis 39:19: "Potiphar was furious when he heard his wife's story about how Joseph had treated her. So he took Joseph and threw him into the prison where the king's prisoners were held, and there he remained. But the Lord was with Joseph in the prison and showed him his faithful love. And the Lord made Joseph a favorite with the prison warden. Before long, the warden put Joseph in charge of all the other prisoners and over everything that happened in the prison. The warden had no more worries, because Joseph took care of everything. The Lord was with him and caused everything he did to succeed."

# EXAMINE

- 1. What did Potiphar do after hearing his wife's lie about Joseph? **Genesis 39:20**. Do you think that the imprisonment of Joseph was fair? How do you react when someone accuses you unfairly?

- **3.** Joseph could have been discouraged and declared himself a victim of injustice. Instead, what did he do? **Genesis 39:22–23**
- **4.** Is it easy or difficult for you to give your best when the circumstances around you are not the best? How can you experience the love of God even in your worst moments?
- **5.** Joseph eventually became leader of Egypt. How did the time spent in prison prepare him for future leadership?

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The lesson presents three principles for your life:

- 1. God leads. God knew that Joseph was going to jail. That was the preparation that Joseph needed for later on in his life. The contacts he made in prison connected him with the palace. Sometimes we have to descend in order to go higher. Why is it so hard for us to believe or understand that God continues to be in control when we are going through hard times?
- **2.** God is with you. Twice in the passage, the Bible includes the phrase "God was with Joseph." It seems strange, because a prison cell is not the first place that comes to mind when you think of the love and presence of God. Can you share with the group a moment in your life when you felt God or saw Him act in a place out of the ordinary?
- **3.** God prospers you. The secret of prosperity is to have a relationship with God and not allow yourself to become embittered by negative circumstances. How is your attitude lately?



This week, when something bad happens to you, think: "This is just the prelude to the great blessing that God has for me." Something big is coming your way. Are you ready?





Genesis 41:37: "Joseph's suggestions were well received by Pharaoh and his officials. So Pharaoh asked his officials, 'Can we find anyone else like this man so obviously filled with the spirit of God?' Then Pharaoh said to Joseph, 'Since God has revealed the meaning of the dreams to you, clearly no one else is as intelligent or wise as you are. You will be in charge of my court, and all my people will take orders from you. Only I, sitting on my throne, will have a rank higher than yours.'

- **5.** Study with me for a moment the word favor. The biblical meaning of the word is that God looks on one of His children in a special and meaningful way. How can you attract the favor of God into your life? **2 Chronicles 16:9; Proverbs 11:27; Proverbs 12:2**

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Take these ideas and make them work for your life:

- **1.** Your testimony gives you authority. Joseph spoke with authority because the Spirit of God was with him and in him. The gospel is demonstrated by our actions, not our words. How can you as a Christian improve your testimony?
- 2. More than "friends in high places," you need the Lord. Joseph was not well connected, and his promotion came directly from God, who ordained a masterfully orchestrated plan to bless him and get him out of prison. What is the danger in self-promotion instead of seeking the promotion of God?
- **3.** The key to God's favor is to walk with Him. As you walk closer to Jesus, you can clearly perceive His plan. Strive to please God, and you will have His favor. Even though salvation is by grace, why is it important to walk in obedience to experience God's favor?



This week, seek to be obedient, and do not indulge in self-promotion. Let God promote you.

1 Samuel 1:1-20. Now there was a certain man of Ramathaimzophim, of mount Ephraim, and his name was Elkanah, the son of Jeroham, the son of Elihu, the son of Tohu, the son of Zuph, an Ephrathite: And he had two wives; the name of the one was Hannah, and the name of the other Peninnah: and Peninnah had children, but Hannah had no children. And this man went up out of his city yearly to worship and to sacrifice unto the LORD of hosts in Shiloh. And the two sons of Eli, Hophni and Phinehas, the priests of the LORD, were there. And when the time was that Elkanah offered, he gave to Peninnah his wife, and to all her sons and her daughters, portions: But unto Hannah he gave a worthy portion; for he loved Hannah: but the LORD had shut up her womb. And her adversary also provoked her sore, for to make her fret, because the LORD had shut up her womb. And as he did so year by year, when she went up to the house of the LORD, so she provoked her; therefore she wept, and did not eat. Then said Elkanah her husband to her, Hannah, why weepest thou? and why eatest thou not? and why is thy heart grieved? am not I better to thee than ten sons? So Hannah rose up after they had eaten in Shiloh, and after they had drunk. Now Eli the priest sat upon a seat by a post of the temple of the LORD. And she was in bitterness of soul, and prayed unto the LORD, and wept sore. And she vowed a vow, and said, O LORD of hosts, if thou wilt indeed look on the affliction of thine handmaid, and remember me, and not forget thine handmaid, but wilt give unto thine handmaid a man child, then I will give him unto the LORD all the days of his life, and there shall no razor come upon his head. And it came to pass, as she continued praying before the LORD, that Eli marked her mouth. Now Hannah, she spake in her heart; only her lips moved, but her voice was not heard: therefore Eli thought she had been drunken. And Eli said unto her, How long wilt thou be drunken? put away thy wine from thee. And Hannah answered and

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said, No, my lord, I am a woman of a sorrowful spirit: I have drunk neither wine nor strong drink, but have poured out my soul before the LORD. Count not thine handmaid for a daughter of Belial: for out of the abundance of my complaint and grief have I spoken hitherto. Then Eli answered and said, Go in peace: and the God of Israel grant thee thy petition that thou hast asked of him. And she said, Let thine handmaid find grace in thy sight. So the woman went her way, and did eat, and her countenance was no more sad. And they rose up in the morning early, and worshipped before the LORD, and returned, and came to their house to Ramah: and Elkanah knew Hannah his wife; and the LORD remembered her. Wherefore it came to pass, when the time was come about after Hannah had conceived, that she bare a son, and called his name Samuel, saying, Because I have asked him of the LORD.

John 11:1-44: Now a certain man was sick, named Lazarus, of Bethany, the town of Mary and her sister Martha. (It was that Mary which anointed the Lord with ointment, and wiped his feet with her hair, whose brother Lazarus was sick.) Therefore his sisters sent unto him, saying, Lord, behold, he whom thou lovest is sick. When Jesus heard that, he said, This sickness is not unto death, but for the glory of God, that the Son of God might be glorified thereby. Now Jesus loved Martha, and her sister, and Lazarus. When he had heard therefore that he was sick, he abode two days still in the same place where he was. Then after that saith he to his disciples, Let us go into Judaea again. His disciples say unto him, Master, the Jews of late sought to stone thee; and goest thou thither again? Jesus answered, Are there not twelve hours in the day? If any man walk in the day, he stumbleth not, because he seeth the light of this world. But if a man walk in the night, he stumbleth, because there is no light in him. These things said he: and after that he saith unto them, Our friend Lazarus sleepeth; but I go, that I may awake him out of sleep. Then said his disciples, Lord, if he sleep, he shall do well. Howbeit Jesus spake of his death: but they thought that he had spoken of taking of rest in sleep. Then said Jesus unto them plainly, Lazarus is dead. And I am glad for your sakes that I was not there, to the intent ye may believe; nevertheless let us go unto him. Then said Thomas, which is called Didymus, unto his fellowdisciples, Let us also go, that we may die with him. Then when Jesus came, he found that he had lain in the grave four days already. Now Bethany was nigh unto Jerusalem, about fifteen furlongs off: And many of the Jews came to Martha and Mary, to comfort them concerning their brother. Then Martha, as soon as she heard that Jesus was coming, went and met him: but Mary sat still in the house. Then said Martha unto Jesus, Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother had not died. But I know, that even now,

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whatsoever thou wilt ask of God, God will give it thee. Jesus saith unto her, Thy brother shall rise again. Martha saith unto him, I know that he shall rise again in the resurrection at the last day. Jesus said unto her, I am the resurrection, and the life: he that believeth in me, though he were dead, yet shall he live: And whosoever liveth and believeth in me shall never die. Believest thou this? She saith unto him. Yea. Lord: I believe that thou art the Christ, the Son of God. which should come into the world. And when she had so said, she went her way, and called Mary her sister secretly, saying, The Master is come, and calleth for thee. As soon as she heard that, she arose quickly, and came unto him. Now Jesus was not yet come into the town, but was in that place where Martha met him. The Jews then which were with her in the house, and comforted her, when they saw Mary, that she rose up hastily and went out, followed her, saying, She goeth unto the grave to weep there. Then when Mary was come where Jesus was, and saw him, she fell down at his feet, saying unto him, Lord, if thou hadst been here, my brother had not died. When Jesus therefore saw her weeping, and the Jews also weeping which came with her, he groaned in the spirit, and was troubled. And said, Where have ye laid him? They said unto him, Lord, come and see. Jesus wept. Then said the Jews, Behold how he loved him! And some of them said, Could not this man, which opened the eyes of the blind, have caused that even this man should not have died? Jesus therefore again groaning in himself cometh to the grave. It was a cave, and a stone lay upon it. Jesus said, Take ye away the stone. Martha, the sister of him that was dead, saith unto him, Lord, by this time he stinketh: for he hath been dead four days. Jesus saith unto her, Said I not unto thee, that, if thou wouldest believe, thou shouldest see the glory of God? Then they took away the stone from the place where the dead was laid. And Jesus lifted up his eyes, and said, Father, I thank thee that thou hast heard me. And I knew that thou hearest me always: but because of the people which stand by I said it, that they may believe that thou hast sent me. And when he thus had spoken, he cried with a loud voice, Lazarus, come forth. And he that was dead came forth, bound hand and foot with graveclothes: and his face was bound about with a napkin. Jesus saith unto them, Loose him, and let him go.

John 8:1-11: Jesus went unto the mount of Olives. And early in the morning he came again into the temple, and all the people came unto him; and he sat down, and taught them. And the scribes and Pharisees brought unto him a woman taken in adultery; and when they had set her in the midst, They say unto him, Master, this woman was taken in adultery, in the very act. Now Moses in the law commanded us, that such should be stoned: but what sayest thou? This they said, tempting him, that they might have to accuse him. But Jesus stooped down, and with his finger wrote on the ground, as though he heard them not. So when they continued asking him, he lifted up himself, and said unto them, He that is without sin among you, let him first cast a stone at her. And again he stooped down, and wrote on the ground. And they which heard it, being convicted by their own conscience, went out one by one, beginning at the eldest, even unto the last: and Jesus was left alone, and the woman standing in the midst. When Jesus had lifted up himself, and saw none but the woman, he said unto her. Woman, where are those thine accusers? hath no man condemned thee? She said, No man, Lord. And Jesus said unto her, Neither do I condemn thee: go, and sin no more.

## FROM PROMISCUOUS WOMAN TO DISCIPLE



John 4:6-29: Now Jacob's well was there. Jesus therefore, being wearied with his journey, sat thus on the well: and it was about the sixth hour. There cometh a woman of Samaria to draw water: Jesus saith unto her, Give me to drink. (For his disciples were gone away unto the city to buy meat.) Then saith the woman of Samaria unto him, How is it that thou, being a Jew, askest drink of me, which am a woman of Samaria? for the Jews have no dealings with the Samaritans. Jesus answered and said unto her, If thou knewest the gift of God, and who it is that saith to thee, Give me to drink; thou wouldest have asked of him, and he would have given thee living water. The woman saith unto him, Sir, thou hast nothing to draw with, and the well is deep: from whence then hast thou that living water? Art thou greater than our father Jacob, which gave us the well, and drank thereof himself, and his children, and his cattle? Jesus answered and said unto her. Whosoever drinketh of this water shall thirst again: But whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life. The woman saith unto him, Sir, give me this water, that I thirst not, neither come hither to draw. Jesus saith unto her, Go, call thy husband, and come hither. The woman answered and said, I have no husband. Jesus said unto her, Thou hast well said, I have no husband: For thou hast had five husbands; and he whom thou now hast is not thy husband: in that saidst thou truly. The woman saith unto him, Sir, I perceive that thou art a prophet. Our fathers worshipped in this mountain; and ye say, that in Jerusalem is the place where men ought to worship. Jesus saith unto her, Woman, believe me, the hour cometh, when ye shall neither in this mountain, nor yet at Jerusalem, worship the Father. Ye worship ye know not what: we know what we worship: for salvation is of the Jews. But the hour cometh, and now is, when the true worshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth: for the Father seeketh such to worship him. God is a Spirit: and they that worship him must worship him in spirit and in

truth. The woman saith unto him, I know that Messias cometh, which is called Christ: when he is come, he will tell us all things. Jesus saith unto her, I that speak unto thee am he. And upon this came his disciples, and marvelled that he talked with the woman: yet no man said, What seekest thou? or, Why talkest thou with her? The woman then left her waterpot, and went her way into the city, and saith to the men, Come, see a man, which told me all things that ever I did: is not this the Christ?



We worship God every day, with our whole lives, not only for a moment or a day.

- 2. Change your attitude and learn how to be happy in any circumstance. Philippians 4:11: "I have learned to be content with whatever I have."



# **Real Healing**

Prayer is the breath of the soul. It is the secret of spiritual power. No other means of grace can be substituted and the health of the soul be preserved. Prayer brings the heart into immediate contact with the Wellspring of life, and strengthens the sinew and muscle of the religious experience. —EGW







**Matthew 8:1–3:** "Large crowds followed Jesus as he came down the mountainside. Suddenly, a man with leprosy approached him and knelt before him. 'Lord,' the man said, 'if you are willing, you can heal me and make me clean.' Jesus reached out and touched him. 'I am willing,' he said. 'Be healed!' And instantly the leprosy disappeared."



- 1. What had Jesus just finished doing when He met the leper? Matthew 8:1
- 2. What was the attitude of the leper when he asked to be healed of his disease? Matthew 8:2

There are some important applications in today's passage.

- 1. Jesus always has time for you. Perhaps for us, one person whom nobody wanted, especially a leper, would have been easy for us to ignore or pass by without noticing. But Jesus did not behave that way. He has time for everyone. How do you feel, knowing that the God of the universe has time for you?
- 2. Go to Jesus with requests, not demands. Jesus is not "Santa Claus" to whom we go with a list of things we want because we've been good. After seeing the leper's attitude in today's story, how important do you think is the way we ask for things?
- **3.** Jesus wants to transform us. Although our disease is not leprosy, it is equally fatal. If you go to Jesus and ask Him in faith, He can do for you what He did for that leper: transform your life. What is preventing you from going to Jesus today?



**1.** This week, find someone whom others are not interested in, and give him or her your friendship. Pray that God will guide you to the person who needs to feel God's love in practical ways.





Matthew 9:9-13: "As Jesus was walking along, he saw a man named Matthew sitting at his tax collector's booth. 'Follow me and be my disciple,' Jesus said to him. So Matthew got up and followed him. Later, Matthew invited Jesus and his disciples to his home as dinner guests, along with many tax collectors and other disreputable sinners. But when the Pharisees saw this, they asked his disciples, 'Why does your teacher eat with such scum?' When Jesus heard this, he said, 'Healthy people don't need a doctor—sick people do.' Then he added, 'Now go and learn the meaning of this Scripture: "I want you to show mercy, not offer sacrifices." For I have come to call not those who think they are righteous, but those who know they are sinners.' "

"Matthew 9:1 – 7: "Jesus climbed into a boat and went back across the lake to his own town. Some people brought to him a paralyzed man on a mat. Seeing their faith, Jesus said to the paralyzed man, 'Be encouraged, my child! Your sins are forgiven.' But some of the teachers of religious law said to themselves, 'That's blasphemy! Does he think he's God?' Jesus knew what they were thinking, so he asked them, 'Why do you have such evil thoughts in your hearts? Is it easier to say "Your sins are forgiven," or "Stand up and walk"? So I will prove to you that the Son of Man has the authority on earth to forgive sins.' Then Jesus turned to the paralyzed man and said, 'Stand up, pick up your mat, and go home!' And the man jumped up and went home!"

Here are three principles to apply in our lives:

- 1. Our actions are a product of our thoughts. The Pharisees "complained" (an action) because their minds were perverted by sin. If you want to change your life, change your way of thinking. What negative thoughts does Jesus need to transform in you today?
- 2. God will do His part, and you do yours. Our part is to not give a place to the devil; in other words, whenever a negative thought enters our mind, we must reject it in the name of Jesus. Consider the following example: A person is harassed by negative thoughts about self-esteem. How do you help them change their way of thinking? What advice would you give from the Bible about their value as a human being?
- **3**. Jesus promises to make the change happen today. In the same way that Jesus has changed the minds of millions, He can change yours. Would you like to give Jesus your mind and your thinking and ask Him today to make you a positive person who is full of faith?



Whenever a negative thought crosses your mind, at that very moment, say a prayer and give it to God. After several days, you will notice a difference in your thoughts. Come back next time ready to share the change that God is doing in your way of thinking.





Matthew 8:5-10: And when Jesus was entered into Capernaum, there came unto him a centurion, beseeching him, And saying, Lord, my servant lieth at home sick of the palsy, grievously tormented. And Jesus saith unto him, I will come and heal him. The centurion answered and said, Lord, I am not worthy that thou shouldest come under my roof: but speak the word only, and my servant shall be healed. For I am a man under authority, having soldiers under me: and I say to this man, Go, and he goeth; and to another, Come, and he cometh; and to my servant, Do this, and he doeth it. When Jesus heard it, he marvelled, and said to them that followed, Verily I say unto you, I have not found so great faith, no, not in Israel.

- 1. The words of Jesus have the same power as His presence. We do not have the physical presence of Jesus among us now, but we have His Word. When we claim the promises of Jesus in our lives, we see the same power working in us that we would have if Jesus were physically present here with us. Can you share any problems you have at this point, that you need a word of Jesus to resolve?
- 2. Our faith is demonstrated by the way we speak. As we saw the faith of the centurion by the way he talked, other people are going to see our faith by how we express ourselves. Do you tend to be a person who speaks with faith, or do you feel that your faith is weak? How can you change the way you express yourself to speak with confidence and faith in God's promises?
- **3.** Words without power are not effective. One of the texts today taught us that words must be accompanied by power. That means not just talking. While words reveal our faith, actions confirm our faith. We are to put our faith into action! Who do you know that talks a lot but does little? How annoying is that! How can you get that power you need for your words to be effective? Share your response with the group.

In order to have a healthy attitude toward money and finances, understand the following principles:

- 1. Even if you have money, you will always need something in your life. Zacchaeus, despite being a wealthy man, had no peace. He had heard of Jesus but did not know Him personally. Many people say they know about God but live as if they don't know Him. Hopelessness, anxiety, and bitterness can drown us as we try to fill the void in our heart with the wrong things.
- 2. There will always be obstacles in your life. Zacchaeus had two types of obstacles that prevented him from seeing Jesus. The first was the crowd, the second was his stature. Likewise, obstacles will prevent us from seeing Jesus. Some will be external in nature, such as finances, family, criticism, ridicule, or work. Others are internal, such as fear, insecurities, failures, and disappointments. Do not let the obstacles prevent you from knowing Jesus personally!
- **3.** There is no need to fight alone. By accepting Jesus' call, Zacchaeus entered into a relationship with Him. Jesus came to his home, and his life changed forever. Jesus knows your pain. He knows the struggles and desires of your heart. You can do today what Zacchaeus did then. Respond to Jesus' invitation, and He will fill your life with joy and give you what money can't provide you!

The story of the Israelites is often reflected in our lives. We have many dreams for our lives, our family, our work, but in a blink of an eye, the giants of this world can obscure our dreams. We learn some lessons from the story of Caleb that can help us to dream again:

- 1. It is never too late to start dreaming. Caleb dreamed for forty-five years, and at the age of eighty-five, God granted him his dreams. It may be that you are in a stage in your life when you think your dreams have disappeared, but you should never limit God in what He can do for you. In the situation where you are, God will give you the strength to start dreaming again! What dreams would you like to achieve?
- 2. Not all your dreams come true easily. The bigger your dreams, the greater will be your obstacles and your giants. But the bigger your giants, the greater your God. He enables us to face these giants and achieve our dreams. It all depends on our willingness to say, like Caleb: "Give me that mountain where the giants live!"
- 3. Our dreams are fulfilled in following the Lord. Three times we find the phrase in **Joshua 14** that Caleb "followed the Lord." God promises, "You will seek me and find me, when you seek me with all your heart" (**Jeremiah 29:13**, NIV). Our success as human beings is tied to our relationship with God and our search for Him.

1 Thessalonians 4:13-17: "Brothers, we do not want you to be ignorant about those who fall asleep, or to grieve like the rest of men, who have no hope. We believe that Jesus died and rose again and so we believe that God will bring with Jesus those who have fallen asleep in Him. According to the Lord's own word, we tell you that we who are still alive, who are left till the coming of the Lord, will certainly not precede those who have fallen asleep. For the Lord himself will come down from heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God, and the dead in Christ will rise first. After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord forever. Therefore encourage each other with these words" (NIV)

How can we be hopeful in the face of death?

- 1. Believe in the risen Savior. The most awesome thing about death is that Jesus already defeated it! He even mocks it in 1 Corinthians 15:55 But the good news is that He wants to share that victory with us. He created us to live, and as we connect with Him, the source of life, we have life. Have you surrendered your life to Jesus? Trust your life to Him today. Whom have you lost that you would like to see again?
- 2. Understand death. People have many different ideas about what happens when we die. The Bible is not silent on this subject. Here are some facts: Life equals God's breath + the body (Genesis 2:7). Death is the reverse (Ecclesiastes 12:7). When we die, we die (Ecclesiastes 9:5–6; Psalm 104:29; Psalm 146:4; Acts 2:29, 34). The word soul is a widely misunderstood concept; it means a living being, which the Bible says will die (Ezekiel 18:4, 20). People who die are neither in heaven nor in hell. They are asleep. Those who die having accepted Jesus as their Lord and Savior are waiting to hear the powerful voice of their Creator. What are some of the misconceptions in movies and TV about what happens when we die?
- 3. Wait for the Second Coming. The text says that we will enjoy heaven after the second coming of Jesus, not before {1 Thessalonians 4:17; see also Luke 14:14}. Jesus comes to reward each of us according to what we have done (Revelation 22:12)—but no one goes to heaven ahead of the rest. We will all go together. We will enter heaven and receive life together. It will be a great reunion. Do you want to be there? Then make the best decision ever: Give your life to Jesus today! Live life as if He will come today!

- 2. We live in a materialistic, "you are what you produce" society. Was God a little bit too optimistic by suggesting that we "take a day off from it all"?

We are free to worship God through eternity; free to drink from the limitless wisdom of God through eternity.

Take a physical rest from the routine of your day; relate to God through prayer, reading, listening to music, or a sermon for at least twenty minutes per day; then take time to feel renewed and restored for another ten minutes. Practice this as often as you can and begin to see the Sabbath as a whole day to rest, to relate to God, and to be restored by His love.

The way in which God transforms the human being occurs in three stages:

- 1. When we accept the sacrifice of Jesus, the transformation begins. Invite Him to live in your life and begin a daily relationship with Him. You are transformed into new creatures. This is known as a spiritual birth or conversion. When did you accept Jesus as your Savior? How did you feel?
- **2.** As we walk with Christ, the transformation continues. Throughout the Christian life, spiritual transformation occurs, and you begin to see spiritual fruit such as patience, kindness, self-control, and joy. The purpose of this process is that every day we look more like Jesus. This stage is called sanctification.
- 3. When Jesus Christ comes the second time, He will complete the transformation. Christ promised to return to transform the reality of humanity forever. The Bible tells us, "Then I saw a new heaven and a new earth, for the old heaven and the old earth had disappeared. And the sea was also gone" [Revelation 21:1]. Isaiah 65:17 18 confirms this when it says, "I am creating new heavens and a new earth, and no one will even think about the old ones anymore."
